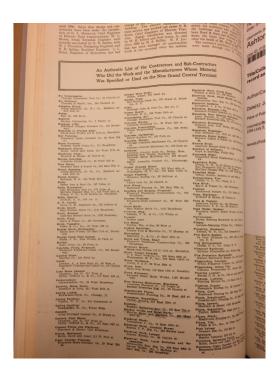
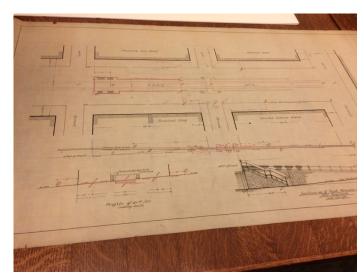

The title of this page is "An Authentic List of Contractors and Sub-Contractors Who Did the Work and the Manufacturers Whose Material Was Specified or Used on the New Grand Central Terminal". The list is arranged in alphabetical order by materials and the name of manufacturers or individual names. The materials and works include bronze ornaments, carving stones, floor tiles, and much more. When I read this list very carefully, I found the name of manufactures or individual names in Utica and Chicago besides New York City. We are inclined to suppose that the Grand Central Terminal is the work of Vanderbilt and we always focus particularly on him. However, The GCT was
