For our last archive visit we went to the Interference Archive in Gowanus, Brooklyn where we met up with Mike Clemow who runs his own podcast and radio station called Radio Free Gowanus. He talked to us about a variety of topic but the main subject and the one relating to us the most was his journey in developing his radio station and the challenges that he had to fight through. When he first began to develop the idea he wasn't even sure it would be possible because of the technological issues and not to mention the legal issues, seeing as this would be a pirate radio station. Through some adversity he was able to start the radio station but that lead to more issues like not being able to broadcast 24/7 and no more than a mile away. He even mentioned how much work a podcast actually takes, he said, to cover a 20 minute podcast it would take him a week, if not more, to collect the information, sounds needed, and to produce and edit the podcast. Also that he has only produced 3 or 4 podcasts from the time he began the radio station, that is how much time is required to develop it. This gave me a newfound respect for podcasts because of the commitment and work that is necessary. In addition it put into perspective how our groups should be tackling our podcast assignments.
