Narrative Illustration Process

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

Concepts










Loose character sketches and trying out different clothes.

The Concept I chose to Illustrate

The feedback I had received on this concept was that Robin Hood needed to look less relaxed as she and Little John watched King John and Sir hiss pass by in the Sherwood Forest. So I needed to make it look more like Robin Hood was about to attack and not just sitting there with Little John in the tree. It was really helpful advice and I really tried to apply that into the final illustration.

Value Studies







My value studies were very quick and put together very messy. I figured it would be easier to do the value study digitally rather than traditionally because I didn't want to mess anything up in the sketch.

Color Mockups and Lighting







For my color mockups the main goal was to do a quick coloring before I did it traditionally. This was helpful because I didn't have to waste paper or risk the chance of my markers drying out. The lighting I struggled with and is most likely super subtle because I am not very experienced in that just yet.

Here is my line art for the final illustration. It wasn't very difficult and didn't take me very long. The only thing that took most of my time was having to redraw the horse drawn carriage. It was a very important aspect of the drawing and needed to be done however, it took a while.



Final Illustration



I wish I wouldn't have colored Little John all black because you can't really tell that it is him.




If I were to do anything differently it would be the pose of Robin hood and the shape and color of Little John. I think my color palette turned out slightly lighter than what I originally intended but I think it's pretty. I scanned this image and took it into Photoshop and adjusted the levels to get a warmer illustration. I also added a red frame, which makes me think of a storybook.















I had gathered images from many different websites. Most of my references that I used were from Pinterest and are in my Pinterest board. However, for my horse drawn carriage I got it from amazon. It was a figurine/toy and it was very helpful, it helped me simplify the shapes and focus on details. For certain parts of my character sketches I had referred to the Living Lines Library and went straight to Brave. This was extremely helpful as my story had contained a female lead who was also very skilled in archery. It was also just fun to draw robin without her bird skull mask looking like Brave's Merida.
