The article does address every part of my research question. It explains architect Lawrence Halprin's design intentions and visual language by saying that he "used concrete to create rugged, climbable topography that echoed canyons, waterfalls and riverbeds, and were intended to bring nature back into cities riven by urban renewal. He drew watercolors of the rocks and trees of the Pacific Coast, then translated those shapes into geometric compositions."
