Design Philosophy:

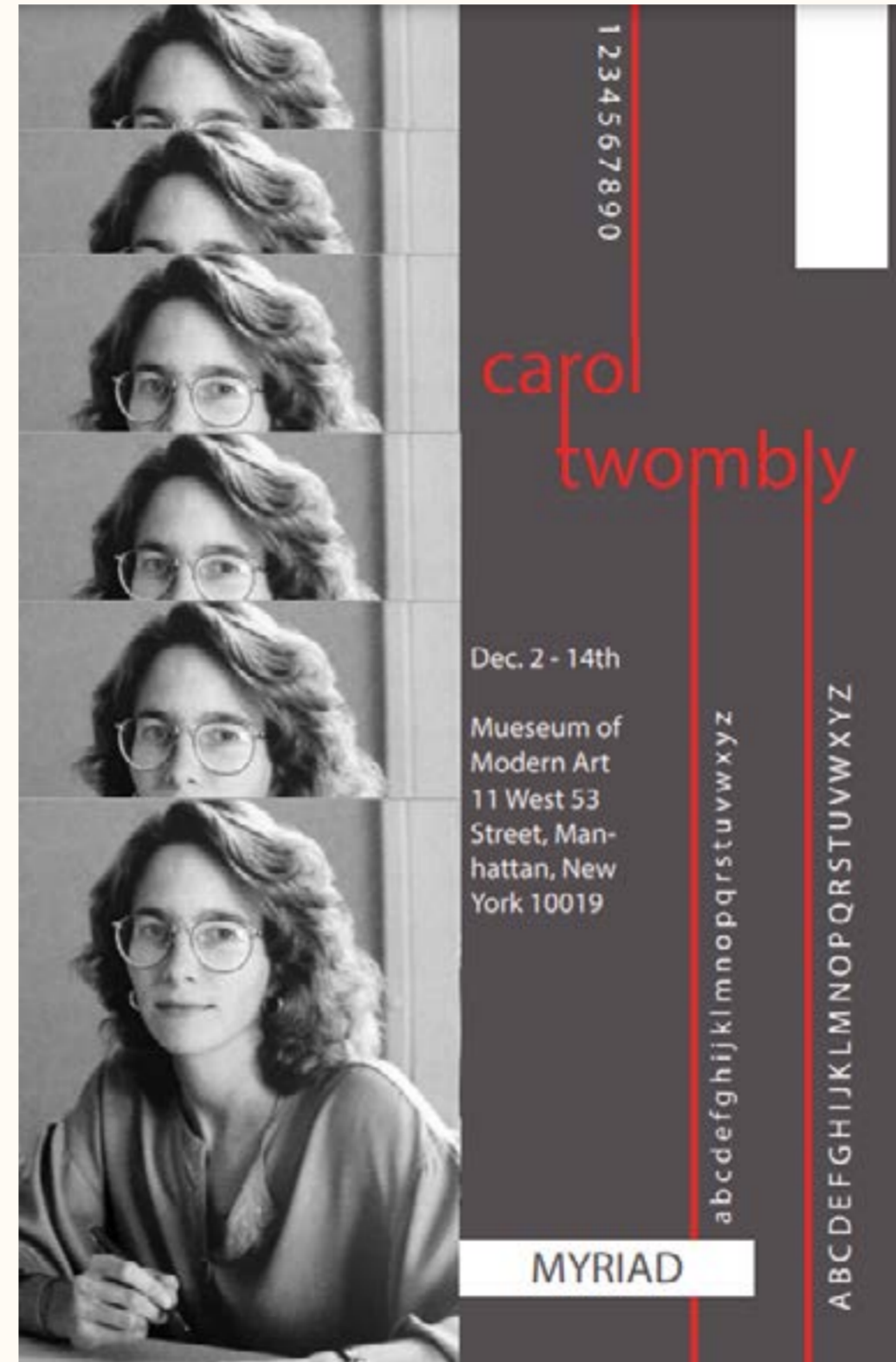
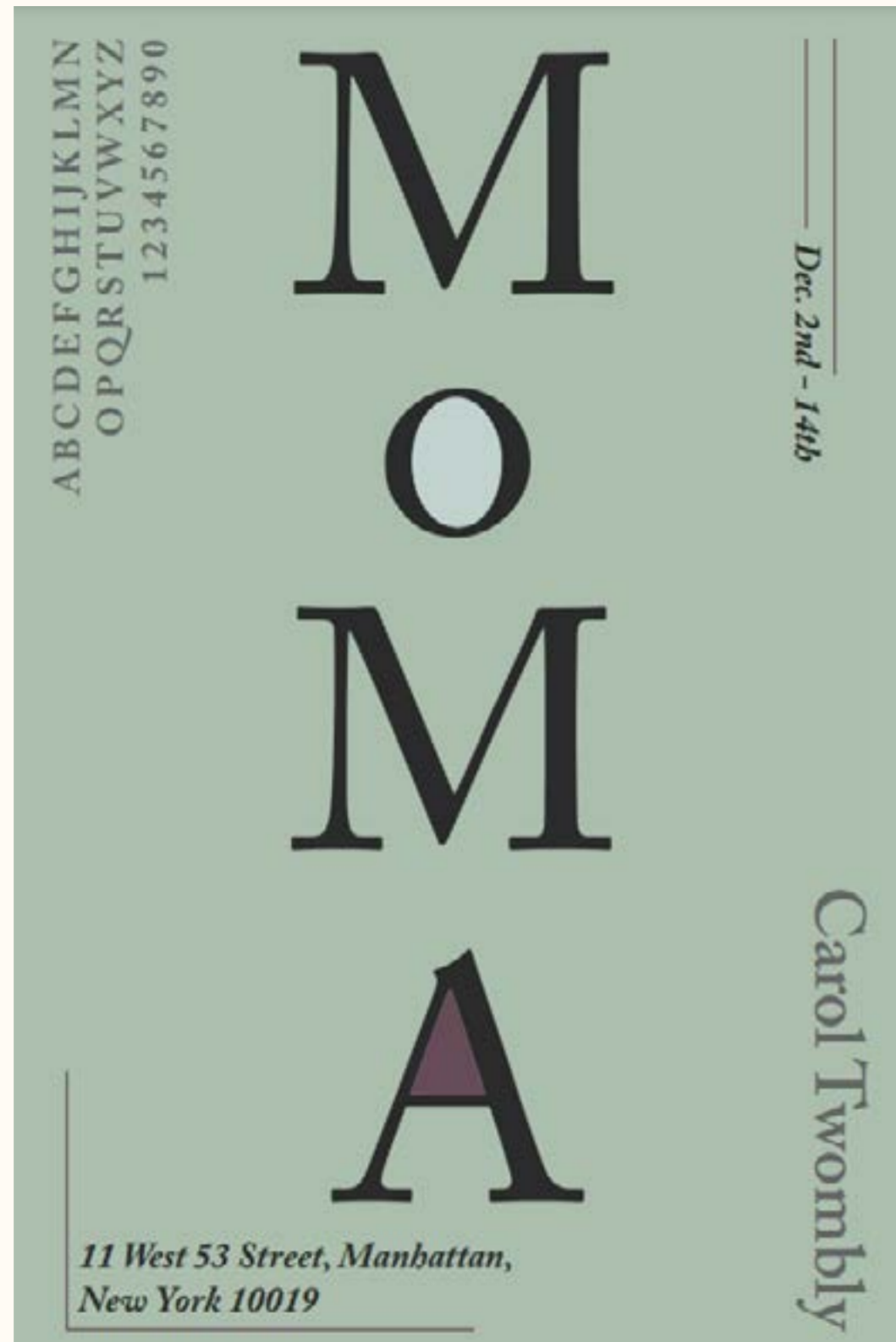
- Combined historical inspiration with digital precision.
