Photographer Mini Research Project

Papers are due: Monday, April 9th

You must submit your papers on Blackboard (your papers will be checked via SafeAssign)

For this paper, you will have the opportunity to explore a photographer in greater depth. You will create an educational presentation in PowerPoint (or equivalent, such as Google Slides). Your presentation will have 10-15 images with a minimum of 300 words for the whole presentation.

Produce a PowerPoint slide show about an influential photographer of your choice selected from the list below (please ask for my approval if you want to work on a photographer not on this list). The project should be between 10 to 15 slides and include the information below. Use a minimum of 10 photographs. Please save your presentation as a PDF file to submit your paper on Blackboard. n.b. do not use *Prezi* presentations for this assignment.

Your presentation will give an overview of your photographer and should provide the following information. *Avoid putting all your text on one slide. Keep in mind that you are producing a slide file to educate, therefore, combine text and image as creatively as possible:*

1. Photographer's name and basic biographical information. Is he/she still alive?
2. What is their style of photography (ex: photojournalism, editorial, documentary, advertising, portraits, magazine, sports, war)?
3. Are there any special photography techniques this photographer uses in his/her work? (Think about composition, depth of field, lighting...)
4. Who or what are some of the photographer's early influences?
5. Are there any interesting stories about this photographer or his/her work?
6. What do you like (or not like) about their work, and why did you select this photographer?

Blackboard’s SafeAssign checks your paper against a Google-like search engine and other student papers on file. You will receive 0 points for your paper if the matching rate exceeds 35%. Wait several minutes after you submit your paper to see your SafeAssign report. If the matching rate is too high, I strongly recommend that you re-write your paper with your own words to get it below the 35% threshold because receiving a 0 will reflect badly on your final grade.
