Climate change is small changes in the average temperature of the world that develop and lead to large and potentially dangerous shifts in the climate and weather. These temperature changes cause extreme weather events to occur that leave dramatic complications around the world. Climate change can indirectly lead to population displacement by setting off these violent weather events.

From 2006-2011, 26.4 million people were displaced out of their countries because of extreme weather conditions caused by climate change. These people are considered to be climate refugees. Climate refugees are people who have been forced out of their homes and communities because of gradual alterations in the natural environment. Many become internally displaced, others cross any and all borders in order to survive. Syria has experienced a drought that lasted for five years, which caused a mass migration of their people. After fleeing war-torn Syria, most Syrians migrated to Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, Europe, Canada and in small measure to the United States. 1,500 Syrian refugees entered the United States since 2011, living in Brooklyn, New York. President Obama had promised to accept 10,000 Syrian refugees, but the country's governors are opposing resettlement in their states, others are supporting these refugees.

Gender Equality is a human right, that states men and women should receive equal treatment and should not be discriminated against based on their gender. Our world faces a persistent

gap in access to opportunities and decision making power for women and men. All around the world women face unequal treatment, with fewer opportunities for economic contribution then men. Women experience less access to basic and higher education, and less political representation. The request for women equality is deeply radicalized when it directs discrimination that women experience based on class, race, and sexuality.

About two thirds of counties in the developing regions have achieved gender parity in primary education. The United States was recently ranked 19th in the world on its gender gap index. Elected members of Congress only consist of less then one fifth of women. Political empowerment is the greatest gender equity issue for the United States. Although there are more women then men that attend college in the United States, women's earning power still remains 20% lower then mens.

NJ Creates Energy Bank
