CHALLENGE

The COVID-19 pandemic presented, and continues to present, numerous challenges to the AEC industry. The Unified Task Force was the immediate response of the AIA New York State Disaster Coordinator and AIANY's Design for Risk & Reconstruction Committee (DfRR) in March 2020 that brought together AIA New York City (AIANY) and AIA New York State (AIANYS) who continue to collaborate on developing successful solutions in numerous areas of design, planning, communications, manufacturing (PPE), and engagement.


ROLE

As AIA New York State's Disaster Coordinator, Illya convened the cross-sector Unified Task Force within days of New York's COVID-19 response shutdown. The Task Force provided immediate needs response coordination to the City, State, and AIA membership. Those responses included identifying more than 1,000 buildings suitable for hospital and emergency expansion with the New York State Department of State (DOS) and AIA members; PPE production and delivery statewide; liaisons to healthcare architects and engineers with the Department of Health (DOH), and coordinating with ASHRAE's National Task Force on building advisories.

OUTCOMES

AIANY recognized that New York City and our communities had reached an inflection point in the progress of the COVID-19 pandemic. Illya expanded the Unified Task Force into a wide range of working groups in partnership with fellow professional organizations in the AEC industry, stakeholders, and city agencies. Working groups encompassed temporary healthcare facilities; an advisory work group on HVAC upgrades for building owners and managers; liaisons to universities; non-profit and volunteer activation; PPE production; activation of healthcare architects, engineers, and facilities managers; and a statewide building survey with DOS.

By May 2020, the Unified Task Force under Illya's leadership had pivoted to become Reimagining New York, a set of long-term strategies to meet the continuing challenges of the COVID-19 crisis. This full-spectrum coalition engages the design community, AEC organizations, and government agencies to create guidance and address the complexities that will characterize a post-COVID-19 New York City and State.

With the New York City Economic Development Corporation (NYCEDC) and NYCxDesign, the Task Force launched the Design Corps Network, which pairs volunteer architectural designers with restaurants to help them adapt to the open-street model and new indoor dining regulations

The Task Force also launched the Community Design Challenge across all five boroughs to address long- term neighborhood changes resulting from the pandemic. Another Task Force team is drafting a Disaster Assistance Handbook addressing future operations for AIA New York State.

AlANY and DfRR recognize that the time has come, once again, to reimagine the built environment: how it affects New Yorkers' health and wellness, today and long into the future. Each building type and environmental condition will be affected by COVID-19, and subsequent environmental hazards like this pandemic will create a variety of challenges that can be mitigated in part through updated design and building practices. This essential work is ongoing now and will continue for the foreseeable future.
