- CUNY New York City College of Technology took in 2,861 first-time degree-seeking undergraduates in 2014. This is 8.5% fewer students than the previous year's (2013) total enrollment figure of 3,127.
- Very low graduation rate that has come out to be 24% over the last 6 years.
- Has a high student-faculty ratio that comes out to be 20:1 meaning that there's more in need than those helped.
