RELATIVE PRONOUNS

Relative pronouns follow nouns and either (1) make clear who or what you are talking about, or (2) provide additional information about the noun.

Examples

- (1) I need to find someone **who** can pick up my dry cleaning.
- (2) Sushi, which can be very expensive in restaurants, is actually easy to make at home.

who: refers to a person (as the verb's subject)

whom: refers to a person (as the verb's object)

which: refers to an animal or thing

what: refers to a non-living thing

that: refers to a person, animal, or thing

Who vs. Whom

Who or whoever is always the subject of a verb. Use who or whoever when the pronoun performs the action indicated by the verb.

- Who won the marathon last Tuesday?
- I wonder who came up with that terrible idea!

On the other hand, whom and whomever serve as objects. They are used when the pronoun does not perform an action. Use whom or whomever when the pronoun is the direct object of a verb or the object of a preposition.

- Whom did Frank marry the third time? (direct object of verb)
- From whom did you buy that old record player? (object of preposition)

Tip: When deciding whether to use *who* or *whom*, try this trick. Reorder the sentence in your head, using either *he* or *him* in place of *who* or *whom*.

Original	Reordered sentence
Who/Whom do I consider my best friend?	I consider <i>him</i> my best friend.
	I consider <i>he</i> my best friend.

Which reordered sentence sounds better? The first one, of course. So the trick is, if you can use *him*, you should use *whom*. If you can use *he*, you should use *who*.
