RE: Final Report for Proposal 16-17 New Course **AFR 3301ID Around the Dinner Table:
The Visual Culture & Art of African Diaspora Foodways**

Proposal Overview

Course Number and Title: AFR 3301ID - Around the Dinner Table: The Visual Culture & Art of African Diaspora Foodways

Course Credits and Hours: 3 credits, 3 class hours

Prerequisites: any AFR course and ENG 1101

Catalog Description

This course explores the intersections between foodways (defined as the cultural, social and economic practices relating to food) and the visual culture/art history of the African Diaspora. The focus is on the African American and African Diasporic engagements with food that have shaped Black culture from the 19th century to the present. Particular attention is paid to scholarship that illustrates the importance of images and artistic practice within this discourse on food.

Rationale

This course is designed to align with the African American Studies Department's mission and fills a gap in the curriculum through its interdisciplinary focus on the emerging field of foodways studies and the disciplines of art history and black studies.

Strengths

This course is needed at City Tech because it will greatly enhance the interdisciplinary nature of the African American Studies department through collaboration with other departments. It will allow students to recognize a variety of perspectives, and the ways in which these perspectives are often informed by history, identity, access, and different disciplinary approaches. The guest lectures from the Hospitality Management faculty reinforce the interdisciplinary framework of the course.

The course provides all Baccalaureate degree seeking students an additional course choice in the college option in the area of interdisciplinary courses.

Weaknesses

The subcommittee has not identified any weaknesses in the final version of the proposal.

Concerns Addressed

The subcommittee and Provost's office offered several recommendations for revision. Through the vetting process, the following revisions were made:

1. Addition of ENG 1101 – English Composition I as a pre-requisite
2. Elimination of the attendance policy and clarification of the grading policy
3. The catalog description was made consistent throughout the proposal (tense, active voice)
4. Minor changes to the student learning outcomes
5. Inclusion of the Title IX training statement regarding field trips

All feedback were incorporated into the final proposal by the proposer.

Subcommittee Activities

The subcommittee met with the proposer, Prof. Emilie Boone and Chair of AFR, Prof. Lise Hunter during the spring 2017 semester to discuss the proposal; however it could not be presented until the ID Committee had reviewed and passed it. The revised proposal incorporated the both the ID and Curriculum subcommittee's comments. The final meeting on 9/18 included Provost Bonne August, Associate Provost Pamela Brown, Dean Justin Vazquez-Poritz and Kim Cardascia. Recommendations suggested throughout the course of the review process were implemented in the final version of the proposal.
