The meeting was called to order at 6:05. The meeting was chaired by Chairperson, Sophia Shaw.

Greetings/Introduction

Each member reintroduced him or herself to the group.

Approval of minutes

Motion to approve minutes was deferred.

ABA Reapproval

Prof. Mennella informed the Board that our reapproval report is complete and will be submitted to the ABA on November 23, 2020.

Curriculum

The current Statement of Requirements was distributed, and Board members were asked to comment on the proposal to eliminate the current Legal Research I course and fold it into what is now offered Legal Research II. Legal Research II currently focuses on online research, whereas Research I focuses on book research. The consensus of the board, after discussion, was that book research is now only useful as a foundation for online research, and to that extent can easily be accommodated in a single 4-credit Research course. The board was in support of the proposed change.

The Law and Paralegal Studies Department will soon be offering its first interdisciplinary courses. In conjunction with the Humanities Department, we will offer Theater and Law, and in conjunction with the Social Science Department we will offer History of Fashion Law from 1945 to the present. Theater and Law will be available to students in the spring semester of 2021, and History of Fashion Law in the fall of 2021.

Remote learning

Sara Schechter and May Saleh gave the professor's and student's perspective on the experience of remote learning. Since the pandemic shut our physical school in March, the school has moved to online courses except for certain internships and lab courses. The hardest part of our curriculum to reproduce online has been the internship courses. At present the department is offering a simulated internship, but all agreed that the students are missing the networking opportunities, the varied work experience and the thrill of the real-world work setting. Although there are ethical as well as health considerations in trying to have the students do actual legal work either from home or in an office setting, Professor Mennella did ask the group to contact her with suggestions for virtual internship opportunities for our students.

Law and Paralegal Studies Club

May Saleh, Club President, reported that the Club spearheaded a campaign to change the name of the major on the transcript and diploma from Legal Assistant Studies to Paralegal Studies. The Club drafted a Petition,

In researching the matter, it was discovered that the terms Legal Assistant and Paralegal are no longer interchangeable, and that the term paralegal more accurately describes the duties such as legal research and drafting pleadings for which our students are trained.
