DESCRIPTION OF MINOR MODIFICATIONS AND RATIONALE

The Hispanic Studies Minor was designed for students who, regardless of their proficiency level, wish to learn more about the Hispanic language, literature, and culture. The academic minor aims to provide students with an in-depth comprehension of the existing diverse cultures and languages (Spanish, Quechua, Guaraní, Aymara, Nahuatl, etc.) in the 21 Hispanic countries. Aside from mastering an intermediate or advanced proficiency level in Spanish (requirement of two language courses), students delve deeper into social practices and traditions such as history, music, arts, and literature through different elective course options. They may focus on Hispanic music (MUS 1211, MUS 1212), Latin American history (LATS 1461), literature (LATS 2202), and culture (LATS 2204), or on issues affecting the Latin American population living in NYC and other urban areas (LATS 2501). These elective courses are taught in English.

This proposal provides additional curricular options to students enrolled in the Hispanic Studies Minor, widening their choices of elective courses from the six currently offered to eight in total. As a result of these new additions, students will amplify their knowledge of Hispanic history and culture from an interdisciplinary perspective. Moreover, these two ID courses will help students, who have already earned most of their General Education course credits at the time they enroll in the program, to complete the academic minor at no additional cost.

The programmatic learning outcomes of the minor are reflected in both course description (AFR 2402ID; HIS 3208ID), as highlighted below:

Hispanic Studies Minor: Programmatic learning outcomes

- Demonstrate written and conversational mastery of the Spanish language.
- Demonstrate critical and analytical abilities through discussion and analysis of texts, films, music, and linguistic data.
- Demonstrate sensitivity to diversity and cultural differences.
- Demonstrate an understanding of Hispanic cultures and perspectives based on cultural practices and products.
- Understand and examine the nature of literary/cultural creations and phenomena within their specific context.

AFR 2402ID: The Heritage of Imperialism. Course Description: This course offers an examination of the thought, structure, operation and results of imperialism in human history generally, and in the 9th/21st centuries in particular. European/American imperialism in the non-white areas of the world: the role of the Industrial Revolution; the imposition of Western European institutions on indigenous peoples of Africa, Asia, North/South America; colonialism; attempts by these people to reestablish autonomous sociological and cultural systems.

HIS 3208ID: US Immigration History. Course Description: The history of various groups which make the United States a melting pot, how and why these groups arrived in the United States, how they accepted or rejected assimilation into American society, how they coped with the problems that face immigrants as well as major events in American history such as the Civil War, the Great Depression or World War II. In addition, the development of nativism and other manifestations of discrimination and how they affected each group as it attempted to integrate into American society.
