OUTER CLOTHING

- 1. There were two different types of bodice a high neck and a low neck.
- 2. Enormously padded "trunk" sleeves, cut wide from the shoulder and narrowing to the wrist in a leg-of-mutton shape.
- 3. The bodice was reinforced with a stomacher, a pointed, narrow panel of stiff fabric, embroidered or oversewn with jewels, which ended in a deep V shape.
- 4. Skirts were slightly shorter, revealing shoes and feet. The whole effect was of women teetering precariously off balance.

Under Clothing

- 1. A farthingale (French) was worn beneath gowns. A farthingale was a hoop worn beneath a skirt to extend it horizontally.
- 2. Corsets were worn under gowns to give a flattened and triangular shape.
