1103 Civ Pro: Causes of Action & Remedies! ?? What is a (legal) claim ?!

<u>Claim</u> = alleged wrong; P's legal reason to sue D

- > a.k.a. "cause of action," "claim for relief"
- > stated in P's complaint (document filed in court to commence case)
- ➤ <u>legal basis</u> for P to <u>recover</u> (to "win," obtain relief/remedy, *such as* damages)

Remedy = what P asks a court to award her, to resolve her cause of action/claim

- > a/k/a "relief," "redress"
- purpose = to "right the wrong," to "make whole"

Some Common Civil Causes of Action!

Tort claims

- wrongful act that injures another person, or her/his property, or reputation.
- include intentional, negligence, and strict liability torts
- governed by common law ("case law," court decisions)
 - Examples of *intentional torts*:
 - o assault = threat of intentional unwanted physical contact
 - o battery = intentional unwanted physical contact
 - o conversion = (essentially) theft
 - o defamation = false statement harming reputation

- > Negligence torts are unintentional:
 - o failures to act with reasonable care
 - o e.g., personal injury, wrongful death, and malpractice (professional negligence)
- > Strict liability torts involve inherently dangerous activities:
 - o D is liable for injuries <u>regardless</u> of intent or care, e.g., gasoline trucks

Contract claims

- disputes between parties to an agreement
- P alleges D broke the agreement ("breached" it)
- In NY, governed mostly by common law, plus some statutory law.

Some Common Civil Remedies!

Damages = \$ that court orders D to pay to P, because of injury D caused to P

- *include* compensatory, punitive, nominal damages (*USFL v. NFL!*)
- "monetary relief"

Injunction = court order that D must do, or stop doing, something

- D is "enjoined" from doing something
- e.g., stop engaging in an unfair business practice
- "injunctive relief"

Declaration = court's order answering a disputed issue

- e.g., stating ("declaring") that D violated a certain law, or D violated P's rights under a contract
- "declaratory relief"

1101 Intro: Career opp's cont'd: Peer-review resumes!

A good resume:

- \triangleright is "positive" \rightarrow but **TRUTHFUL!**
- \rightarrow is free from errors \rightarrow **PROOFREAD** it!
- is one page if possible!

<u>Cover letter</u> = letter to potential employer stating that you are applying for position, and enclosing your resume.

- ➤ It "covers" your resume!
- It should highlight two or three items particularly relevant to this position!
