For FYLC #2, you researched and read secondary legal sources relating to important questions that interest you! *Now* we will think about, and practice, how to use those sources effectively in our writing.

**PLEASE** read Kyle Stedman's essay, "Annoying Ways People Use Sources," which (most of) you read in Prof. Hall's English class. Then write a two-part response to post on OpenLab, addressing each of these items (about 100-150 words each):

- A. What did you learn from Stedman's essay that might apply to your use of <u>legal</u> sources in your writing? You may discuss using <u>secondary</u> legal sources, like the law journal articles most of you used for your legal source entries, or you may discuss using <u>primary</u> legal sources, like cases we've read (such as *Sussman* and *Leuthner*), or statutes, or constitutions, or administrative regulations. You are also welcome to discuss how to use the sources in <u>legal writing</u> (like the sample memorandum we reviewed) or in other forms of writing, like papers you write for other courses.
- B. Write a few sentences using one of the "quotables" from the legal source entry you posted for FYLC Collaborative Assignment #2. Try to follow Stedman's guidelines! Identify at least one specific guideline of Stedman's that you followed, like "Dating Spider-Man," or "I Can't Find the Stupid Link." © Explain how why and how you followed that guideline.
