**Jurisdiction** = court's authority to decide a particular case; depends on a variety of factors such as geography, subject matter, the parties involved, etc.

# **Basic American court structure** (fed & states) = 3 tiers:

# **Highest appellate courts** (top → "supreme courts")

- have <u>appellate jurisdiction</u> (no trials; just legal argument)
- "courts of last resort"

## **Intermediate appellate courts** (middle)

- have <u>appellate jurisdiction</u> (no trials)
- consider <u>appeals</u> from lower courts

#### **Trial courts** (lowest)

- have <u>original jurisdiction</u> (courts of "original instance," or "first instance")
- hold <u>trials</u> of fact
