Statute = law created by legislative branch of a government (U.S. Congress or state legislature)

Organized into **statutory compilations:**

- Federal = "**United States Code**" (U.S.C.) → **official!**
Unofficial:
 - United States Code Annotated (U.S.C.A.) (published by West)
 - United States Code Service (U.S.C.S.) (published by LexisNexis)
- New York = "**Consolidated Laws of New York**" → **official!**
Unofficial:
 - McKinney's Consolidated Laws of New York (West)
 - New York Consolidated Laws Service (LexisNexis)

How do I cite? United States Code, Title 42, Section 1983 (See BB Rule 12!!)
42 U.S.C. § 1983.

Administrative law = law created by the executive branch of a government

- *by the chief executive* (President or Governor)
- *OR administrative agencies* (FDA, DOE, etc.)

Executive order = order issued by the chief of a government's executive branch (President or Governor). *It has the force of LAW!*
