forecasting is not only applicable to fashion, other businesses such as




home decor, consumer goods, and food industries use color forecasting. The importance of color

Being that the double-breasted suit is common in corporate offices, there is transparency in regards to how much the consumer makes. Article *The Salary Ranges of Office Workers* explains that office work that requires immense skill features salaries averaging around \$65,000 (Dowd, 2021). In terms of psychographics, this consumer holds themselves to a high standard and oftentimes wants to be the center of attention.

The double-breasted suit jacket is a unique take on the general suit jacket due to its eye-catching features. The consumer adheres to these features and aligns them with their personality to create a stopping shows how stopping aura. Confidence is another personality trait the consumer flaunts as Megan Gustashawn emphasizes in her GQ article *The Double-Breasted Suit Remains an Unimpeachable Style Move*. She also goes on to explain how this current generation of men's fashion has projected the utmost versatility and bravery (Gustashwan, 2021).

Double-breasted suit jackets like many other garments come in a variety of colors and styles. With that being said it is expected the consumer has more than one double-breasted suit in their closet. Whether the front panels feature 4 or 6 buttons, each style holds a different meaning to the consumer. For example, one suit may be designated for special outings such as weddings or birthday parties while the other is for date nights or fancy dinners with peers (Stoicoff, 2021).

Six Trends (Double Breasted Suit Jacket)

The double-breasted suit jacket has gone through an immense change throughout its lifetime. With the change, trends have come and gone, some longer than others. Although some of these trends do not have direct terms linked to them, each trend's unique characteristic does just that. The first trend the double-breasted suit experienced was "athleisure". This was around the time the double-breasted silhouette was first introduced to the suit jacket in the mid-1800s (Bros, 2021).

The suit jacket at the time featured its iconic 6 buttons around the waistline area and a long tail.

Usually, the tail was split into two to create an exaggerated draping effect. This version of the double-breasted suit jacket was worn mostly by

European males who took part in sporting events such as horse riding and boating. British aristocrats popularized this version of the double-breasted suit jacket by wearing them to special events.



However, due to its association with sports outings, the public deemed it as inappropriate and distasteful attire. "It was, surprisingly, considered a somewhat informal garment, at least until popularized by the Prince of Wales in the '20s and '30s" (Andrews, 2021). The suit jacket was also referred to as the reefer jacket, as it was also worn casually by British sailors who served in the navy.

The second trend that catapulted the double-breasted suit jacket to prominence can be referred to as Duke. Although this is not the official term of the trend, a big reason as to why this

trend came to be was because the Duke of Windsor adopted the previous trend yet showcased it much differently in the late 1940s. The silhouette of the double-breasted suit changed immensely as the tail that people once paraded was non-existent and the classic six buttons featured around the waistline area became four. In addition to the Duke's popularity and influence, what he did when wearing the garment is what popularized it. The Duke began wearing the double-breasted suit jacket

to formal and special events such as engagements, parties, weddings, and traditional events. European men especially the British became increasingly fond of the Duke's daring fashion take on a piece that was once deemed inappropriate by many. The Duke of Windsor's personality is also attributed to the trend as he was known to be laid back and calm. It was evident that he was much different than his predecessors as they restricted themselves to the fashion trends at the time regarding British royalty. The Duke was not as flashy and admired comfort and versatility, which he found in



the double-breasted suit jacket (The Gentleman, 2021). The double-breasted suit jacket even made its way to the United States as notorious crime boss Al Capone wore the suit jacket with its ensemble. This trend is deemed the most powerful as it projected the *zeitgeist* at the time so accurately.

In the later years of the 1960s, the double-breasted suit jacket did not see much light. Some people perceived the double-breasted suit jacket as an ancient artifact and would be well off left in the past. The suit jacket merely scratched the surface of American fashion, but after the 1950s its

ever-changing trend gradually lost momentum. However, the suit jacket re-emerged on the fashion scene in the 1980s. This is when it established its presence in the office and other workplaces. This trend can be considered the dullest the double-breasted suit jacket has been. Unlike the past two

trends, the double-breasted suit had no prominent features or striking changes that trailblazed a certain fashion. This trend will be coined "office", as this was the appropriate setting at the time to wear it. People with occupations such as banking and corporate work usually wore this garment.

"And while those mob bosses wore the double-breasted look with much aplomb, the style gradually lost its flair, and by the 80s and 90s was relegated almost entirely to



businessmen and frumpy insurance salesmen in ill-fitting and flat grey numbers – John Gotti, notwithstanding' (Lehman, 2021).

Approaching the 1990's this trend slowly died out as people perceived the suit jacket to be extremely formal to be worn in casual settings.

In the early 2000s, the double-breasted suit jacket was not seen as much. However, a *pendulum* swing seemed to emerge as the four-button and six-button versions of the suit jacket came up simultaneously. The silhouette of the suit jacket's cut was slightly slimmer than previous trends.

"Old school DB suits—the ones the gangsters used to wear—were characterized by their boxy, looser shape. Today's versions are slimmer all over, which makes them much more flattering and wearable" (Gustashaw, 2015).

Still, the double-breasted suit jackets were yet to be exposed with bold color and head-turning features. The colors at the time were quite mute usually a solid navy or black. In retrospect, the double-breasted suit jacket has seen the most flare in the hands of British royalty.

Fast forward to the present day, the double-breasted suit jacket has seen a strong emergence. Many fashion houses have created their perception of how the double-breasted suit jacket should look like. While they do so, a recurring theme of creativity and not holding back is greatly present. From the buttons to the silhouette itself, the trend that the suit jacket is experiencing today can be coined as the "creativity trend". Despite most of the suit jackets being fitted as ever, one thing the suit jacket tends to emulate is the characteristics of being bold and confident. The cut and style of the present-day double-breasted suit jacket feature eye-catching colors and patterns and buttons that may even surpass the classic four or six. The lapels have also changed dramatically as the cut looks like a deeper v shape, allowing the chest area to become more prominent. As time does mirror fashion, women are also wearing the suit jacket as well. In comparison to how women were heavily restricted with freedom and society's perception today, women have seen immense progress. The same can be said about women's fashion as the double-breasted suit jacket is being sported by the fierce women that paved the way for their peers.

color," he told The Post (Fleming, 2021). This trend has no restriction to age, race, or gender. Even cases surrounding cultural appropriation have not been introduced to the double breasted suit jacket. The color of the suit jacket is expected to be more vibrant than ever considering the styles 2 years from today.

The double breasted suit jacket is also projected to alternate between four and six buttons. Despite

that some buttons are not functional and solely for aesthetic purposes, that has not stopped clothing lines from experimenting with different materials. In the past, the double breasted suit jacket has been made from prominently wool (Wicks , 2021). However, many variations of the double breasted suit have been seen in velvet, velour, and sleek satin finishes. And if that is not the case, the suit is usually paired with something that gives off a show stopping glimmer. Glamour Magazine covers this as celebrity Mindy Khaling was recently spotted in a hot pink double breasted suit paired with a silk pink button down shirt" (Wittmer, 2021). Overall the trend forecast for the double breasted suit jacket calls for bold colors with a storm of sleek material(s).

Trend Report

The double-breasted suit hasn't significantly changed between the years 1920 and 1930. Double-breasted designs were being worn on Frock coats and Naval Reefer jackets. Reefer jackets were originally used by "reefers" in the British Navy. Also known as the sailors who worked 'midships' (Montgomery, 2015). Their role was to 'reef' the sails, in other words, they furled and unfurled the sails to catch the wind. The reefer jacket featured the double-breasted design, the buttons were located on the sides making sure the robes didn't get caught up in the buttons. Another particular feature of the double breasted jacket was that the buttons were engraved with anchors.



As stated prior, the Frock coat is another honorable mention that was using double-breasted designs. The frock coat originated in the mid-1700s. The coat was used for formal occasions. This coat was mainly worn from the 1800s to the 20th century. The frock coat is a knee-length overcoat, buttoned-down to the waist. The coat drapes over the lower half of the body. There are two primary styles of frock coat Victorian and Old West (Hall, 2021). The double-breasted suit hasn't changed much from the mid-1700s until now.

As a response to the dominating super-skinny silhouettes of the last decade to today for the "baggier" style of fashion forward formal attire, new product offers include a variety of modern fits and proportions.



Despite the millennial/Gen-Z attitude to the dominance of menswear in recent years, when it comes to wearing a DB jacket, there are still some standard guidelines to follow. When it comes to

Your jacket's number of working buttonholes relates to the number of buttons that must be fastened. At all times, fasten all buttons into their appropriate buttonholes (Husband, 2021).
