Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was an important leader in the US Civil Rights Movement of the 1950s and 1960s. A Baptist minister most of his life, he was born in Atlanta, Georgia in 1929, and fatally shot on his hotel balcony in Memphis, Tennessee in 1968. This iconic text is the speech King gave on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. at the Civil Rights 'March on Washington' on August 28, 1963.

- 2. Imagine King could see the US today—what would he think? What would he say? Do you think he would be satisfied with the progress made since his speech? Write a short essay detailing what his reaction might be.
