The Library at New York City College of Technology is important for giving the students the tools they need to succeed in their class and future. The school offers students many academic resources, technology, and a study space that can be provided physically in the library and online. The library's staff and faculty have a goal for bringing great success to their students through the resources and services they provide that can have a positive impact on the diverse City Tech community.

The library was first set up in the Pearl building around the late 1940s to the early 1950s.

It became a place many students went, until the staff and faculty learned the library was becoming overcrowded. They expanded to the building at Franklin and Flushing avenues, which was called Franklin Avenue. Graphic arts, commercial art and marketing were in "Franklin Hall".

The service wasn't great nor did they have their telephones working. It seated twenty people and was open sixty hours a week. Namm library opened in 1967. Things got better with seating, furniture, equipment and the budget paid for expansion

of book and periodical collections. They even increased the number of librarians. But they also had conflicts on the side with the library being below the cafeteria. They had water issues and ventilation issues, which made Namm last only twenty years. Then they started working on the Atrium building. They had gone through the difficulty of making the library a better place for the students and resources. After all the building and moving of libraries, In 2018, the Atrium was renamed the Library Building. Then followed moving to the internet to better help students online, which over the years made it easier due to more resources and help being added for the students.

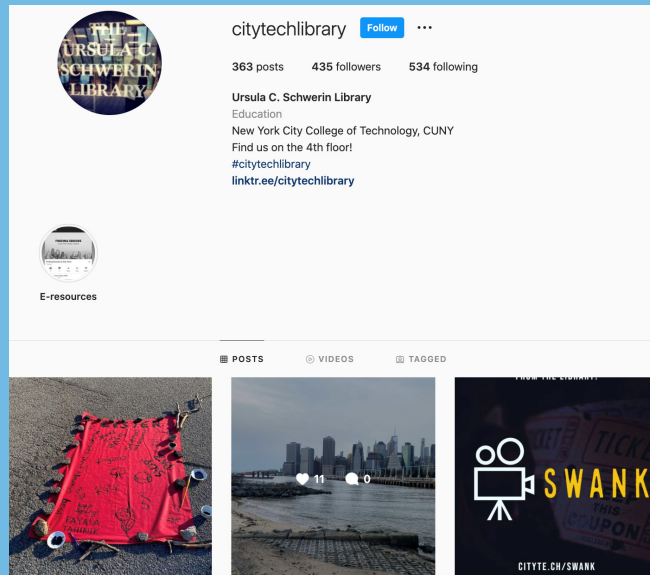
"Ask a Librarian"

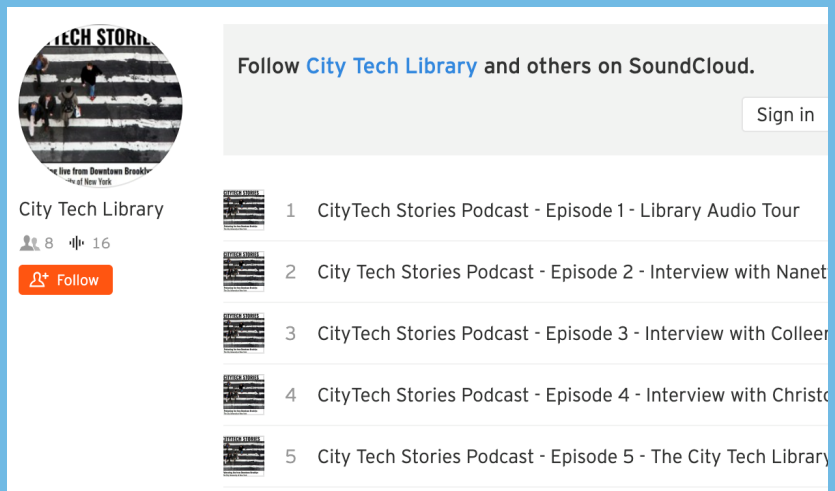

The COVID pandemic has affected City Tech faculty, staff, and students in many ways. demic has affected City Tech faculty, staff, and students in many ways. At the City Tech library, one concern is how to best serve students who are currently unable to access our print resources. While our online databases and ebook collections are an incredible resource, many City Tech students traditionally rely on the library to borrow course textbooks. Reserve textbook collections at City Tech are by far our highest circulating materials because many students can't afford the expense of buying their own. [The prices of textbooks are notoriously inflated.] This problem isn't unique to City Tech. A recent article in Inside Higher Education (IHE) illustrates that even in academic

libraries that have reopened, like the library at Roger Williams University—the small residential school profiled in this piece—librarians and students are frustrated because the demand for course reserves far exceeds the supply. According to the IHE article, “libraries that have built up print reserves of textbooks aren't able to circulate those materials as they did before the pandemic, either because materials are being quarantined” or because library access is limited. Nicole Allen, an Open Education Resources advocate quoted in the article, notes, “the pandemic has intensified and exposed so many gaps and cracks in our society, and access to course materials is one of them...Students are struggling. So are faculty, and so are libraries.” The Center for Disease Control (CDC) says that catching COVID-19 from a book is unlikely, but it still recommends quarantining returned books for at least 24 hours between loans. Since COVID can live on surfaces for 2-3 days, most libraries able to lend books are quarantining books for at least 72 hours to be safe. This means that students who cannot afford the high costs of buying their own textbooks can no longer rely on the library for help, even if their library has reopened. The lack of access to course reserves means many students are unable to do the assigned reading, complete homework, or study for exams. But now, students don't have to worry about these problems any more, because CityTech Online Library has all the material you need!
