Questions for Reading and Discussion


- 1) Which of Leamnson's suggestions had you already been practicing as a student in high school or college? Which suggestions, if any, had you avoided? Which suggestions, if any, are new to you entirely?
- 2) Compare and contrast Leamnson's essay about what to do in college with Nikki Giovanni's "Campus Racism 101." What is each author's purpose in writing? What is each author's intended audience? Write out these two essays' similarities and differences, and then state how these authors' different purposes and audiences might account for them.
- 3) After discussing this reading in class, take a few minutes to write out the main ideas that emerged from the class conversation. Do you agree with Leamnson that "writing has an enormous power to *fix* things in the mind"?

Questions for Writing and Research

- 1) Reread the essay and condense each section into a slogan that captures that section's main point or suggestion.
- 2) Leamnson defines a number of words for his reader. Make a list of these words and write out Leamnson's definitions for them. Then, write out how each of Leamnson's definitions differs from either the "usual" definition with which you are familiar or a standard dictionary definition. If most (if not all) of these words, like "information" and "knowledge," are words with which college students are already familiar, why does

Leamnson take the trouble to define them? How are his definitions important to his overall purpose in writing the essay?

3) Choose one or two sections of the essay and design a handout for your classmates in which you re-present the ideas and suggestions there using both visual and verbal means.



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
