



In a democracy every vote counts, and the general rule is that the majority wins. In this game the more you win the more your vote counts. All is not fair in fun and games.

Everyone has an opinion but whose actually matters?

**Majority Rules**, the game that ensures full chaos at every gathering. Best played with at least 6 players!

**How to Win:** Make the same choice as the majority of other players to be a SUPER majority!

### Contents

30 hot green voting paddle  
30 hot pink voting paddle  
50 voters choice cards

### Game Setup

Each player gets one of each color voting paddle. The paddles are used to vote for one of two opinions on the choice cards.

### Playing the Game

1. The player with the least amount of sleep the night before goes first. With their back to the rest of the players, the tired player(now the reader) reads aloud the two controversial choices from the choice cards along with their associated color The other players vote with a show of either the hot pink or green paddle that corresponds to their opinion.
2. Once all have voted the reader can face everyone and discover whether or not they are part of the majority.
  - If they are- YES! They can pick another choice card and start from 1 again.
  - If they aren't- BOO! They can pick another player to take their spot (even if they have been the reader before) and join the other players.
  - If it's a tie (**the reader's vote only counts if there are an odd amount of players, not including the reader!** They are **not** the tie-breaker. ie. There are 13 players in total, including the reader, then the reader's vote **does not** count. If there are 12, their vote **does** count.) the reader must convince one of the players to change their opinion. Let the chaos ensue!
3. If the player is part of the majority 3X in a row they become the SUPER majority and they step down but from here on out their vote counts for two people. And they can remind people as often as they'd like.
4. The game continues until everyone is at each other's throats or worse, you're in a cult and all have the same opinions.
