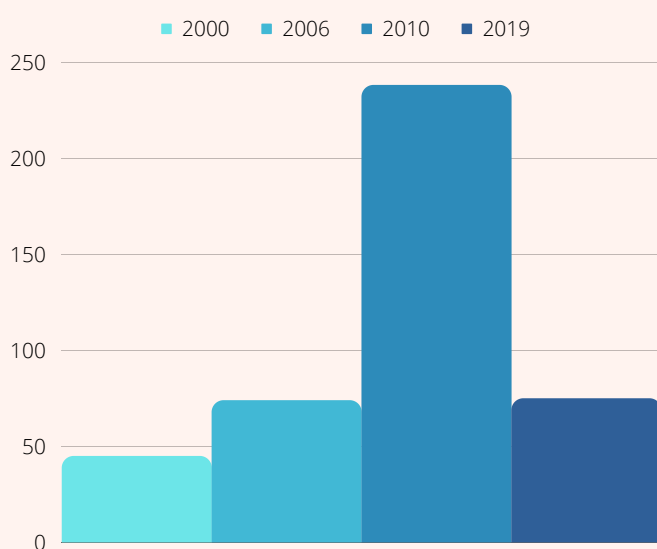
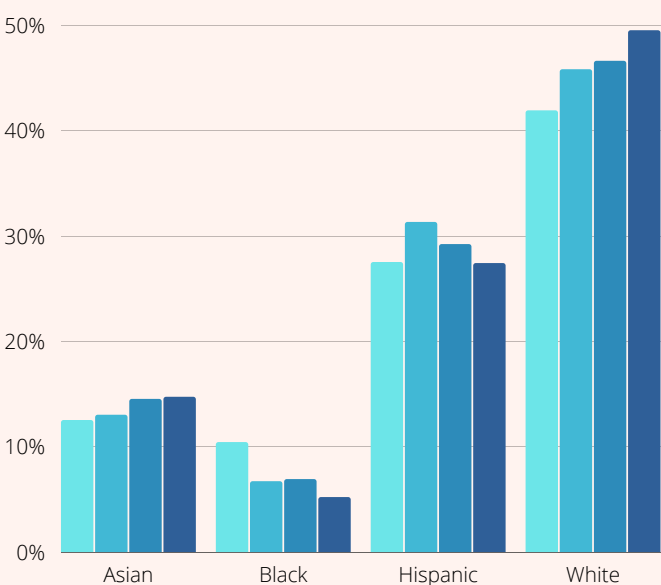
How gentrification has affected the culture and the diversity in NYC neighborhoods

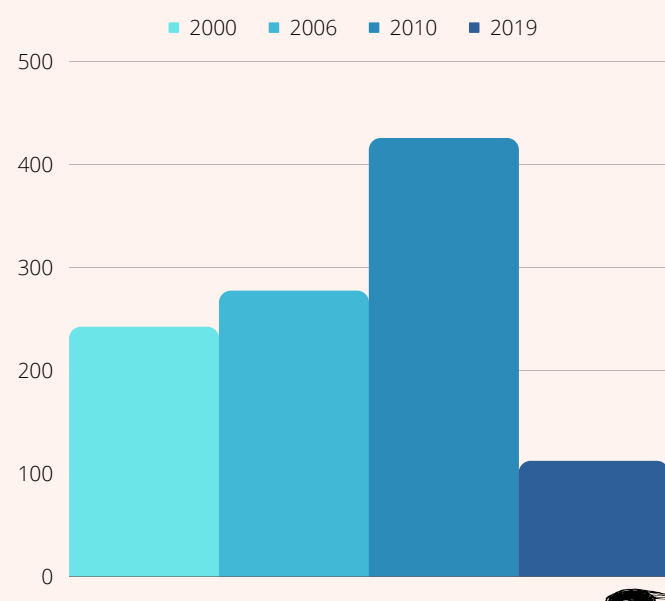
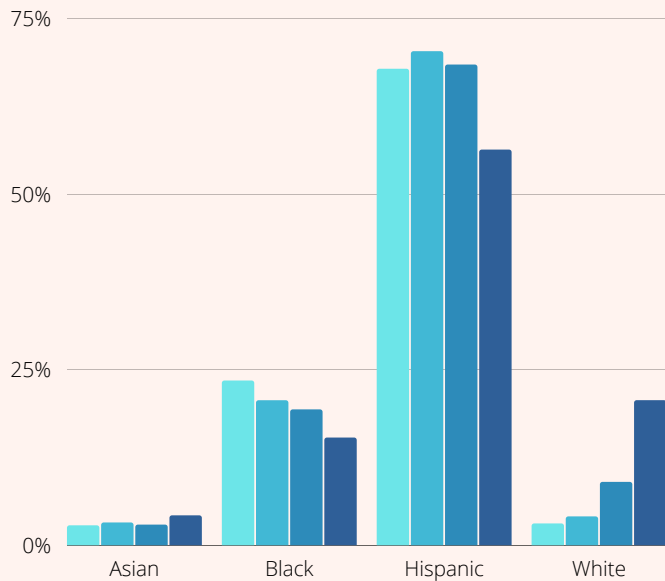
## BUSHWICK, BROOKLYN

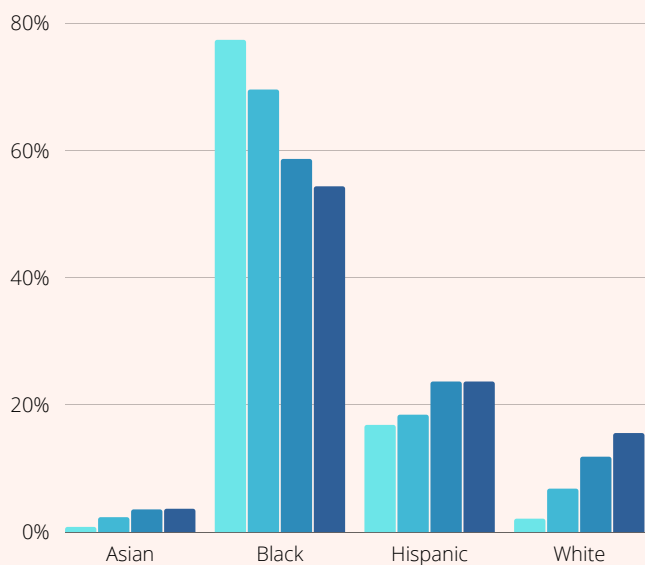
