QR codes placed throughout the exhibition allow visitors to access additional content, such as behind-the-scenes videos, interviews, and design sketches, all available on mobile devices. This digital component encourages audience participation, especially among younger visitors who are more accustomed to using technology in their daily lives. The themes of the exhibition are deeply inspired by history, particularly the traditional craftsmanship of Latin America and the evolving identity of the Latinx community.
