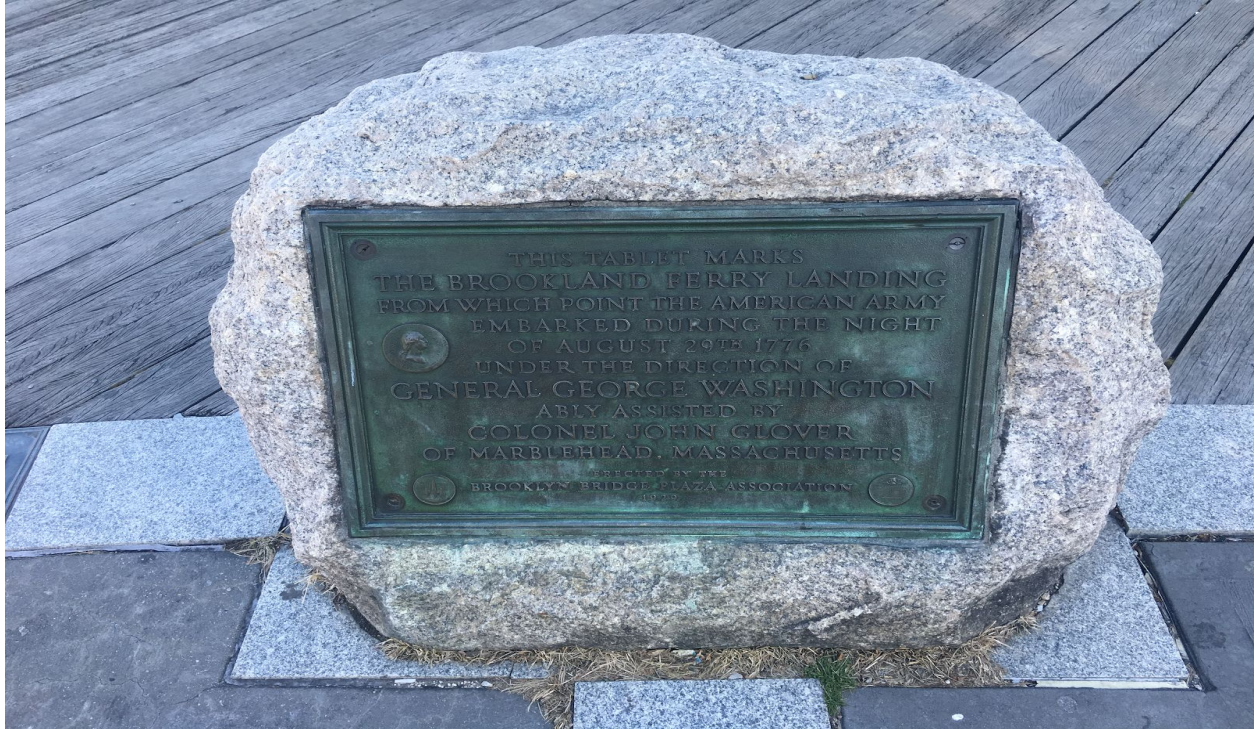
01:00 pm Wyckoff Farmhouse Museum

1. This is a very special museum, The Wyckoff House, or Pieter Claesen Wyckoff House is located at 5816 Clarendon Road in the Canarsie area of Brooklyn. The house is estimated to have been built ca 1652, making it the oldest surviving example of a Dutch saltbox frame house in America.



03:30 pm Waterfront Park

2. Waterfront Park is on the banks of the Brooklyn Bridge along the East River, on the opposite side of Lower Manhattan, there are spectacular views of New York Harbor, Brooklyn and Manhattan Bridge, Lower Manhattan, water on the East River, and of course the Statue of Liberty. 06:30 pm Brooklyn Navy Yard

3. Brooklyn Navy Yard was formerly a commercial shipyard and its history dates back to the 1781 American Revolution. After the independence of the United States, the shipyard built a frigate for the Navy. In 1801, the US government acquired the Brooklyn Shipyard and expanded it. 12:30 pm New York Transit Museum

4. The New York City Transit Museum is located in an abandoned subway station in Brooklyn, New York, USA. It was established in 1976 to showcase the history and equipment of the New

York City subway system, public transport, commuter rail, bridges, and tunnels. The history of transportation allows visitors to have a deeper understanding of New York City's transportation.

02:30 pm Soldiers' And Sailors' Arch Monument

5. Soldiers' And Sailors' Arch Monument is a US Civil War monument. This is the first permanent Arc de Triomphe in the United States to commemorate 4,000 servicemen and 400 citizens who died in the Federation. The arches are built with Portland stone, Gothic style, including two medieval towers connected by classical fascia.

04:30 pm Brooklyn botanical garden

6. The Brooklyn Botanical Garden originated at the end of the 19th century and was originally a dumping area. Today it has developed into a model for excellent urban garden and gardening exhibitions in the United States. Known as New York's "The Wizard of Oz", There are 900,000 visitors every year.



07:00 pm St. Ann and the Holy Trinity Church

7. St. Ann and the Holy Trinity Church, it is a typical Gothic church. She was the tallest building in New York in the early 19th century. There is a small cemetery on the west side of the church, where many well-known financial tycoons and political celebrities are buried. Also, there are many different rumors and horror stories in this church.

12:30 pm Brooklyn Waterfront Museum

8. Brooklyn Waterfront Museum is located at 290 Conover St, Brooklyn. The Brooklyn Museum is a comprehensive museum of art and history. The Brooklyn Museum is the second-ranked museum in the New York City collection, with around 1.5 million exhibits. Its famous collections include ancient Egyptian art and many modern art pieces, and its architectural style is cloth art.



02:30 pm Plymouth Church
