Response Paper

Susan Sontag and Photography Now

“Today everything exists to end in a photograph” — Susan Sontag

You must submit your papers on Blackboard (your paper will be checked via SafeAssign)

In our digital age, photography and related media are vital to how we communicate. This paper assignment asks you to write a response paper to an essay by Susan Sontag, whose writings are important to the history of photography. Sontag wrote the essay “In Plato’s Cave” in the 1970s, but many of her points continue to be relevant to contemporary society. Sontag’s writing is challenging, therefore, please give yourself enough time to read the essay. There is a pdf under the READING tab on the OpenLab website.

Your paper should be at minimum 4 double-spaced pages (4 pages does not mean a 3-page paper plus cover), 1” margins, 12-point type (Please use Arial, Helvetica or Times), not including a cover page. You can write more than 4 pages but please do not exceed 5 pages.

Paper Instructions:

- Give yourself ample time to do the reading and think about Sontag’s essay
- Review the format for a Response Paper by reading the pdf “ESSAY GUIDE” (located on our OpenLab website under ASSESSMENTS)
- A Response Paper includes a brief summary of keys points and your analysis of the author’s argument
- We will discuss and annotate Sontag’s text, and go through the essay format in class

1. Summarizing

Some points to consider:

1. Why does Sontag use the metaphor of the cave?
2. What other metaphors are used?
3. What does Sontag say about why we take photographs?
4. What does Sontag say about how we react to photographs?

2. Analyzing

Some points to consider:

1. Is Sontag's essay still relevant to our times? Is her essay still connected to the uses of photography today?
2. Compare her view to **your own ideas** about photography.
3. Discuss one photograph or photographer mentioned in Sontag's essay.
Do some research on this photograph or photographer and write what you found interesting about the photograph, or artist's work.

Important note: Avoid long quotes in short papers (all papers for this course are short). Lengthy quotes will weaken your paper and diminish your grade. Please look over the grading rubric for written assignments on the class website and be sure to run spell check before submitting your final paper.

An important note on plagiarism
