As it turns out, what you're learning in a writing class is not just how to write three specific papers; you're learning about your writing process, and you're learning to be a part of a writing community (writers don't write alone—not paralegals writing legal correspondence, not journalists writing New York Times articles.) This class is designed to teach you how to get from assignment to idea to research to draft to revised, finished product—and to help you figure out how to do that on your own when you're in the workplace and have no teacher to assign papers to you. This process is what you need to take with you when the class is done. And the homework is meant to help you figure out YOUR version of that process.
