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INTRODUCTION



- 1. All of the Farragut buildings have the same general shape
- 2. The buildings were surrounded by small fences, near the sidewalks of the streets
- 3. Playgrounds and sports courts on the property
- 4. It was raining slightly, so not many people were outside
- 5. The housing grounds cut off the historic Hudson Ave, causing it to be re-routed
- 6. There is a school across the street from the housing buildings
- 7. There was a lot of grass area within the fences

HYPOTHESIS:

- 1. They were named after him because he was a Hispanic man who was the first Admiral in the US Navy, and the building are across from the Brooklyn Navy Yard.
- 2. There are many maintenance issues within the building and the apartments are becoming out of date with poor conditions.

3. The developers wanted to give the housing grounds a welcoming, community feel with a lot of area for sitting around or playing sports.

SUMMARY / POST VISIT REFLECTION

While visiting Vinegar Hill and the Farragut buildings, I recorded many observations along the way. My mind was completely open upon arrival, and I saw a lot more than I expected.
