- 12. Why is the people within the community so secluded from their community?
- 13. Is food in the community affordable? Prices?
- 14. Why is this community made up of majority minority? Is it because of inequality and income or racism and segregation?
- 15. Why did Hutson Avenue get cut off?
- 16. Where did the name Farragut come from?

HYPOTHESIS:

- 1. The residents are so secluded from their community because they are not very optimistic that change will come.
- 2. The deli's and grocery stores are very costly because there is very limited access to fresh food and vegetables so residents usually settle for what is available to them.
- 3. The center is in poor condition because there is no funding available to get it fixed.

After visiting and carefully observing the Farragut houses and the neighborhood I realize it is completed different from my community.
