Setting up your Google Scholar preferences

scholar.google.com → settings → library links → add up to 5 libraries → save preferences



Find it! @ CUNY – connecting users to all of their options for full text retrieval

<u>LibX</u> — library toolbar

- Firefox and Chrome
- Quick access to CUNY+, the catalog
- Quick access to library databases, Google Scholar, WorldCat
- Context menu set up your preferences, then select and right click to search text from a web page

Bibliographic managers

 <u>EasyBib</u> – helps format citations, helps you evaluate online resources, helps you organize your notes/outline; smartphone apps & browser add-ons for Firefox and Chrome; create account on campus and use anywhere

 <u>Zotero</u> – open source citation manager, browser add-on for Firefox & standalone
