INTRODUCTION

This sketch drawing is located in Hudson Ave. It is where the Power Plant is, next to the waterfront. This is *The Commandant' House,* which was built in the early 19th century to accommodate the commandment of the Brooklyn Navy Yard. It is located at the intersection of Little St. & Evans St. The Vinegar Hill mansion served as the home of many Brooklyn Navy Yard commandants.







- 1) The office building was originally a factory building that constructed back in 1910. It is located between Bridge St. and York St.
- 2) This John Street building, seen from Hudson Avenue, is currently used as a self-storage facility.
- 3) The house on the corner is 70 Hudson Ave., whose incoming storefront tenant is Café Gitane.
