

OBJECTIVES




SITE DOCUMENTATION:



The street layout of Vinegar Hill has changed quite a bit, mainly north of Front Street, from 1916-2009, throughout those years, a lot of buildings have been eliminated since 1916, including St. Ann's Church in 1992 at Gold and Front Streets and St. George's Church in 2009 at 109 Gold.



There are pipelines which lead to the waterfront on Hudson St. It seems as if these unused pipelines being used as underground tunnels.

HYPOTHESIS:

- 1. The Underground Railroad, were in a way used as a safety base, it helped slaves escape from captivity. These railroads ran through New York City. In fact, the New York stops were an important junction on the journey to liberty. Many New Yorkers helped African American slaves in order to escape to their freedom.
- 2. They used these tunnels possibly to make it easier for trade-offs, bringing in illegal goods, freedom, & migrating.
