1. What are some general observations about the character of this neighborhood? What does it remind you of? How does it make you feel?

Gowanus neighborhood I remember DUMBO in Brooklyn, the channel is very related to the water around this neighborhood. The two are located in Brooklyn. Both share the fact that they are places that are very important part of the history of Brooklyn. They were primarily manufacturing industry, with warehouses and factories. That eventually gave rise to citizens who started living in the area. Besides being both popular in culture, they are considered as a neighborhood with artistic districts.

2. How is the natural world contained or shaped by human activity or architecture in Gowanus? In what ways does the natural world invade or disrupt human activity or architecture in Gowanus?

Like other neighborhoods in Gowanus, the environment, dangers etc are not incidental, but central to their current identity; The Gowanus Canal, an industrial canal polluted with old factories, coal plants and wastewater discharge points. Other neighborhoods face different types of problems however some neighborhoods are working to clean up the legacies of pollution, Gowanus is almost the only one in trying to do both at the same time. Although most of these factories are now closed and transformed into artists' studios and a cleaner industry, the one created from these manufacturers is still there. As a result, the EPA declared that the channel Superfund site in 2010, which means that the federal government will finance and control the efforts to clean the canal and demand the companies that owned those factories to be able to recover some of the costs. It was expected that the Superfund designation would stop both the development of real estate property. This would cause them to destroy the character of the community, displacing artists and industrial companies that employ thousands of workers.

3. What people did you observe in the neighborhood and what activities are they engaged in?

Beginning with the fact that in Gowanus has certain specific places from president Street you notice a division between different social classes and districts, one looks richer than another and each one is characterized as one an industrial district and another resident. Therefore, the population and culture changes, the industrial district due to the businesses and trade itself will be surrounded by workers, characters or members of the community council. On the other hand,

on the side of the district is the Gowanus community, mostly people who have lived there for many years and the culture varies a lot since it is a historic neighborhood with economic, political and social changes brought about by changes and movements of cultures through the years. There is a large young community that goes to the parks, pets, elders, and state personnel in charge of caring for the canal and cleaning up the area.

Lavender Lake is a restaurant- bar on Carroll St. right next to the Canal. And it's called like that because it used to be Gowanus nick name before.
