
SITE DOCUMENTATION

I know of the area because I had family that lived there, so to see that it was once projected to be gentrified creates clarity for why it looks the way it does today. It can be seen clearly in the map that when developing the new space homes for the Melrose houses, certain gardens had to be demolished for the construction of new housing. Most of the community gardens that were either relocated or combined, in the end just got demolished. Also, the most urgent sites are where some of the urban renewal and new housing projects are located. This is very significant because it shows how gentrification can change a neighborhood and make them feel isolated from the rest of the city.
