
Proposal For MTA and Covid-19

Problem




The MTA's annual budget, before the pandemic, was \$17 billion. From May 20202 to May 2021, the MTA has been spending about \$15 million monthly to clean about 472 stations across the city and a thousand subway cars. Not to mention the MTA was also in charge of

cleaning the Long Island Rail Road (LIRR) and the Metro-North's train stations and subway cars as well. But after May 2021, the MTA began to clean the stations and carts every 72 hours. Not to mention they do try to clean "high-touch surfaces" at least twice a day. So what can be the problem? Well, the problem isn't that the train carts aren't being cleaned enough, it's the stations and the main problem above all is the mask. People do not seem to understand that although yes, we do have a vaccine now and we can try to prevent the virus and hospitalization of those who did happen to catch the virus. But this vaccine is not a prevention of the virus as a whole. But one doesn't want to overstep and cause an uproar between the people and the government, one has the right to their body and how they treat it, but what happens when one's actions towards their own body cause a threat to so many others?

Solution

From November 10, 2021, to November 23, 2021, there were about 18,534 COVID cases in New York City. And that's about 1,373 new cases daily since June 16, 2021. How did we get this high in new cases? The most important thing that the MTA can probably get their hands on is to get the ability to do what they were doing before.
