Images

Image 2 of this lesson directly portrays to one the brutality of World War I overall. Soldiers here were not just joining the war and waiting for peace treaties to be written, hundreds were dying, giving up their lives in the name of that peace. (P2). The deaths of these soldiers were brutal as the image shows a headless soldier being left on a stretcher. (P2). Furthermore, in the background of the image one can see the medical kit that has been discarded into the body of the river. (P2). Both these illustrations can allow one to suggest that while these soldiers went into battle to protect their peace and showcase their nationalities, met their untimely demise instead. This conclusion may allow many around the world today to suggest that war is pointless and unnecessary as it just leaves to either the miserable loss of life or soldiers in the middle of nowhere scavenging small amounts of food. However, the last image ties it all together as one is exposed to the economic and social lives that those back home were able to live. (P3).
