On March 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2023, at 1:00 p.m., I attended the LGBTQIA+ Faculty and Students collective session virtually through Zoom hosted by Laura Westengard. While in the session Ms. Westengard along with guest speakers Ms. Leigh Gold and Mr. Dan Ryan to name a few, shared information on the various ways New York City College of Technology can improve when it comes to allowing students to be safe as well as feeling comfortable expressing themselves or their concerns. I learned what an active safe space should look, as well as the ways to allow one to be comfortable while being around me or another student while being at City Tech. During the session Ms. Westengard discussed the importance of treating others with respected, kindness due to not being familiar with one maybe enduring in their personal lives, guest speaker Ms. Gold shed light on how important it is to respect one's pronouns while engaging in conversation allowing one to not feel dismissed.
