I remember my first time leaving Hunts Point. I was around the age of 10 and my sister took me out to eat in downtown manhattan. We walked toward the closest train station and to this

During my first day in middle school, our Dean made us do a class exercise where each student was side to side and the Dean would read a statement, if the statement applied to you, you would have to step forward, and at the end of the exercise, the whole class was scattered

around the gym. The Dean would explain the exercise and how people are born with different privileges and that we all come from different backgrounds but that doesn't mean we can't reach the finish line. This was the moment that I saw the world for what it was. And after that point, I realized that my parents didn't start the same as me and my siblings.

As I learned more about our government and society, there are people who started the race very behind but were able to achieve things that some would say were impossible for them. One of those people is Oprah Winfrey, she was born to a poor family in rural Mississippi. She suffered a lot of tragedies in her life but was still able to overcome the obstacles in her life. She was the
