
Facts about Standardized



- Students take over 100 standardized tests from pre-k to grade 12
- Most standardized tests are self-imposed by school districts, not the federal government
- Students who live in poverty perform poorly on standardized tests. The best predictor of SAT score isn't education, IQ, or grade level at the time of the exam. It's socioeconomic status.
- Only 26% of parents believe their child is receiving too much standardized testing
- With multiple-choice questions, boys perform better than girls. In open-ended questions, girls perform better than boys. As a result, the gender gap in test results varies depending on the kind of exam given.






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The Problem With Standardized Testing

What is Standardized Testing? Standardized testing is a test that calls for all test takers to respond the same way to all of the questions or a set of questions drawn from a common bank of questions. That is scored in a "standard" or uniform way that enables comparison of the relative performance of specific students or groups of students. 
Standardized Testing

Pros and Cons

Pros:



- Standardized testing helps teachers understand and determine what to teach students and when to teach it
- Determines whether a person is qualified for a specific position
- Parents can get a decent picture of how their children are doing by comparing them to students locally and nationally through standardized testing.

- Standardized tests do not promote student performance; they just identify children who are proficient test takers and provide no useful indicators of development.
- The use of standardized testing is sexist, racist, and classist.
- The results of standardized tests do not indicate future success.
