Many women athletes have addressed the inequality in sports and even the gender pay gap. "Ada Hegerberg, a 23-year-old Norwegian, was recognized as the best female soccer player in the world" and "despite the big award, she has decided not to play on the biggest stage of all, the Women's World Cup" (Mervosh \& Caron, 2019). "Hegerberg quit the Norwegian national team in 2017 in protest of what she said was a lack of support for women's soccer in her home country" (Mervosh \& Caron, 2019). Gender pay gap has been seen throughout many male dominant jobs and even sports. The gender pay gap in the U.S. women's soccer team is a real
thing and no one can deny it. The U.S. women's national team has taken action and has filed a lawsuit. "The lawsuit said that if the men's and women's teams both played a similar 20-game schedule of nontournament "friendlies," the women would be paid just $38 \%$ of what the men would make" (Pound, 2019).
"When it comes to participation, 70 percent of female sports leaders who participated in the report's survey attribute the lack of women's sports media coverage to the still-struggling participation numbers for all girls in sports" (Gibson, 2020). Gender inequality in sports media exists because society thinks women are inferior to men. "Most glaringly, at the college level in 2017-18, women had 62,236 fewer participation opportunities than men in NCAA sports. In the three NCAA divisions, 87 percent of schools offered a disproportionately higher number of athletic opportunities to male athletes compared with their enrollment" (Gibson, 2020).

Serena Williams is one of the most known female athletes. She was able to speak up about gender inequality by writing a letter. "So when the subject of equal pay comes up, it frustrates me because I know firsthand that I, like you, have done the same work and made the same sacrifices as our male counterparts. I would never want my daughter to be paid less than my son for the same work. Nor would you" (Williams, 2016).

Therefore, I pledge that I'm going to make a change in my high school. I want younger girls to feel like they have support and representation. As an alumni, I plan on gathering my teammates and telling the principle about the issues I find within the girls' soccer team. I will make sure that the girls' team equipment and uniforms will be supplied by the school. Also, I will talk to the student committee each year to make sure that they announce whenever the girls have a game. I will not stop until I see change.

Young women deserve as much representation as young males. Together as young women, I believe we can break gender norms and stereotypes. We should encourage and teach the younger generation that they can play any sport they desire.
