YOU'RE TRYING TO STEAL MY CAP YOU WETBACK." You can only imagine how my

sister and I felt. I have never felt anything like that. I mean I knew discrimination occurs in the world but to feel it personally was just beyond me. It isn't my fault that I come from Mexican descendants, it's not my fault that I have it running in my blood. In fact, I am proud because one day I'll walk across the stage and get my Bachelors Of Science and then graduate from a law school, all while being the daughter of two mexican immigrants. My parents might have entered the country illegally but they are still my parents. Being called out for being Latina doesn't phase me at all. Why would I be mad for having a beautiful culture and country? If anything it only makes me stronger. I have a bright future ahead of me and I will become the attorney I want to be. As part of the Latin Woman community I know how hard it is to be seen and be called out just for the color of my skin.
