History and social impact

This is showing that a book that takes place in the past could have borrowed true people and events from any time period and/or any place. Most historical fiction has a specific time period it is based on for example a few popular books that are historical fiction based are from the time period of World War II. These books include but are not limited to *Night* by Elie Wiesel, *The Book Thief* by Markus Zusak, and *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas* by John Boyne. The books give detailed accounts about the life of fictional characters who were based on real people and took place during a period when major world events were happening every day. The genre is important to our society because it gives us a

Discourse community

History itself is a discourse community and there are sub communities within this larger entity. An example of this would be shown in the difference between a peice set in England in the 1800's compared to a piece set in America in the 1950's, they are two very different places in two very different times. Rules and message

According to M.K Tod article "7 *Elements of Historical Fiction*" there are seven distic things that need to be developed within the genre of historical fiction. These examples are characters, plot, dialogue, setting, theme, conflict, world building, and research material notes. This may seem like many things to keep in mind but it's very similar to when thinking about who, what, where, when, why, how. For example the who would be the characters, the what would be the

plot, the where would be setting, the when would be the time period, the why would be the plot, and the how would be the conflict. Research is a very important tool historical fiction writers use to help give their reader an authentic experience of the place and time they choses to write about.

usually wear button down shirts, suspenders, and slacks where women would wear long casual dresses and skirts. They were limited in what they could wear because there weren't as many choices as there is now as well as the fact this way of dressing was the social norm. Some clothing designers take inspiration from different historical times and incorporate it into modern day fashion.

The final constraint would be how underdeveloped a place would be compared to today. There are so many more morden cities as well as technological advancements now then there were in the past. Things like restaurants, clubs, public parks, computers, GPS, the internet, streets, sidewalks, cell phones, cars, and many other modern luxuries that we take advantage of today that they didn't have back then.
