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Question 2 (Carl Elliott)

Elliot's article "Amputees by Choice" describes an issue that individuals are having where they want to amputate specific limbs of their body, even though those limbs are fully functional. Elliot states that this is problematic because, during the time this article was published, there was a surge of people wanting to get their limbs amputated voluntarily.
