## Hart's Primary and Secondary Rules

Is each of the following rules a *primary* or *secondary* rule, on Hart's account? If it is a *secondary* rule, what kind of secondary rule is it (i.e., a rule of recognition, rule of change, or rule of adjudication?)

- 1. Eating oranges in February is prohibited
- 2. Laws about eating oranges are binding only if written in the "Orange law" book
- 3. Disputes about who owns a particular orange are to be decided by the Orange Tribunal
- 4. No person may own more than 8 oranges
- 5. Oranges must be peeled with a dedicated orange peeler
- 6. Any changes to laws concerning oranges can only be made by a 2/3 majority vote of the citizens
- 7. A will concerning the disposition of one's oranges after death is only valid if signed by at least two witnesses

What about these real-life examples of laws? Is each a a *primary* or *secondary* rule, on Hart's account? If it is a *secondary* rule, what kind of secondary rule is it (i.e., a rule of recognition, rule of change, or rule of adjudication?)

- 1. Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof
- 2. To be valid, a will must be signed by three witnesses
- 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly acquire, receive, or otherwise transfer any human organ for valuable consideration for use in human transplantation if the transfer affects interstate commerce.
- 4. Any person who hunts or takes bear during bowhunting season must possess a license and carcass tag valid to hunt big game granting special bowhunting season privileges
- 5. Except where marked by a "Camp Here" disk, camping is prohibited within 150 feet of roads, trails, lakes, ponds, streams or other bodies of water.
- 6. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.
