Our eyes works in weird ways, it captures moments that we find memorable or worth the time seeing. Like Susan Sontag said "What do these people see? We don't know. And it doesn't matter. It is an Event; something worth seeing - and therefore worth photographing" (353).

Whenever our eyes sees a unique image we automatically think I need to take a picture of this or to just sit and watch what captured your eye. For those who take a minute out of their day, they see what the world is giving us in a different perspective. The eye captures images that we don't see on a daily basis for example whenever the sky turns pinkish or the sunset has a brighter color than before. To restate what Susan Sontag said in "On Photograph", "This gives shape to experience: stop, take a photograph, and move on" (534). Which is basically what I did when I took this photo. color as well. The studium of this picture seems to be the water fountain, they all have a different level of height, the middle one seems to be the highest and the rest surrounding it are average size. We could also notice it's not a rectangle or square fountain but actually round by the color of the walls of the "pool". Right where the Fountain is we see a trash can, which for me would be a weird place to put a trash can. My second photo called "Background" was taken right outside my window on March 26, 2018 at 7:08 pm with my Canon T3. Before I took this picture I pretty much tried to take my Camera out as quick as possible. Which is familiar to what Susan Sontag said "To take a picture is to have an interest in things as they are, in the status quo remaining unchanged, to be in complicity with whatever makes a subject interesting, worth photographing" (536). As you can see this photo level looks like I took it from a high place, which is correct. I had to stand on my couch open my window and try to find the perfect lense zoom and focus to capture everything I wanted to. What we could see here is a sunset picture. The sun is a exposing a strong sunlight as we could see from the reflection or ray. It's giving the sky a more colorful look, on the top we see some blue fading away and in the middle from left to right is the orange
