In my version of the story, I decided to have it in modern time, and change the location. To make sure the characters fit in the modern time, I change their appearance.















The Orge Character Design







I chose to go with **Concept**1 because I believe the bank symbolizes the Orge's greed and desire to pillage.


I created two different value studies to see which one will work for the shading and dramatic effect for the Final Art.

In the end Value Study 2, demonstarted the dramatic effect, so I went with it.




