
Ray Bradbury Presentation


<u>Major Works</u>


Some of Ray Bradbury's most iconic and critically acclaimed works include:


"Fahrenheit 451" which came out on October 19, 1953 and is known for

influence and control the public. The book is also praised for its defense
of real and physical literature against the growing electronic market.

"The Martian Chronicles" which was published in 1950 and featured a
collection of short stories that all revolved around the theme of the
colonization of Mars by humans, but the story also was a unique on
human behavior, both good and bad. It is considered a must-read in the
Science Fiction community.

"The Illustrated Man" which was released in 1969 and is known for its
themes of how comfort can be a bad thing and how it may be seen as a
way of accepting death. It is another book that features a collection of
short stories that Science Fiction readers can not get enough of.








Influence on Science Fiction

 Ray Bradbury is not only praised and remembered for his great storytelling and literary style, but is also credited as the man who propelled Science Fiction into the literary mainstream.

• Ray Bradbury is also seen as a pioneer in the Science Fiction since he was not afraid to write stories with dark themes or sensitive topics such as the government controlling the populace or even planned murder. Bradbury was not afraid to go against what was and was not accepted at the time and his bravery helped inspire many Science Fiction writers, readers, and even filmmakers to create whatever stories they could come up with no matter how outlandish or dark they may seem.



Early Influences

 Bradbury was raised in a struggling family who moved constantly between Illinois and Arizona. He also grew up during the Great Depression so this played a role in how he viewed society, the government, and even the world.

 When he was younger, Bradbury was in love with fantasy fiction, so he was inspired by authors like Edgar Rice Burroughs, Jules Verne, and L. Frank Baum who he enjoyed reading from a lot.

 Bradbury made the decision to become a full-time writer when he found out he was ineligible to join the military due to his poor eyesight. Who knows how different his life would have been and what Science Fiction would be like had he been able to join the military.




Awards & Honors

 In 1984, Bradbury received the Prometheus Hall of Fame Award, which is an award dedicated to honoring classic libertarian fiction award. He received this award for his work on the iconic "Fahrenheit 451".

 After Bradbury passed away in 2012, many people who were inspired and admired his work paid their respects to the legend, including former President Barack Obama. "His gift for storytelling reshaped our culture and expanded our world" stated Barack Obama.

 In 2007, Bradbury received a Pulitzer Prize Award for his long and distinguished career that helped inspire a generation of readers, writers, and artists of all forms.
