First, I adhered a lace lining at the front of my shirt and towards the back of the dress with a black mesh material onto the white t-shirt, the material of the black mesh was made from recycled plastic. The black mesh on the

front and back of the t-shirt is to symbolize the true *texture* of my hair which shows the ongoing *transformations* that my hair went through just so that I could fit in with societal appearance rules. Then, I *adhered* to the back of my t-shirt a half-African/ Dominican flag to show where I come from and that I'm proud to be from there.
