

- This is a Sidewall designed by Jean Lurcat and Manufactured by Pierre Chareau.
 This is dated to be made back in 1924 and the medium that this was made on was a block print on machine paper.
- The style that this design is based of is Dada. Dada is an art movement that has

- This is classified as Dada because of the birds, music notes, leaves and geometrics. These are all randomly placed and makes no sense whatsoever.

2. CHAMBERS BROTHERS BAND



 This poster was designed by Victor Moscoso. It was printed by Graphics Arts of Marin and Cal Litho and it was published by Neon Rose. It was dated to be made on 1967. The medium that this was made on was lithograph on wove paper.

3. JAPANESE CRANES OVER WAVES TILE




- This was designed by Christopher Dresser and Manufactured by Milton, Hollins &
 Co. It was dated to be made in 1870. The medium that this was made on was glazed earthenware.

- What makes this a Ukiyo-e design is that these were often scenes of nature,
 landscape, society, etc. And here we see as the title suggests cranes over waves

- The design style this is based off is Swiss International Style. The swiss international style is an movement that favored legibility and often used a grid.


This is apart of swiss international style because of the use of the grid and the
